SAWTRY BEWARE?

Just imagine – 200 plus more cars on Sawtry's roads; up to 1000 more people at the Co-Op and the Surgery, and perhaps 500 more children crammed into Sawtry schools!

Could this happen if Fox Land's appeal to the Secretary of State – to overturn recent decisions, by Parish and District Councils, to twice refuse applications for 230 new houses to be built off Gidding Road – is successful?

This appeal is to be heard at a four day Public Local Enquiry, starting at 10am on the 9th June. However, due to the lack of a suitable

hall it will, apparently, be held not in Sawtry but at the Buckden Millennium Hall.

Twenty-two years ago, in 1987, an almost identical application on the same site, but for 300 houses, was turned down after strenuous public resistance. Will the same happen this time?

A much smaller development – perhaps 15 houses - on the old "brown field" site which forms part of this current application could perhaps be welcomed but surely Sawtry as we know it would not survive the alternative massive growth of around 12%? What do you think?

TREE WARDEN REPORT

March is seeing a flurry of activity to catch up with work which would have been better done earlier were it not for the snow etc.

The Angling Society planted more hedgerows at the Fishing Lake, which along with the willows planted last year will really improve the area for anglers and wildlife. Work has yet to be completed on the small derelict hedgerow on Fen Lane opposite Chapel End, where removal of the old fence started in January and then hit problems with rain or snow. It will be replanted and re-fenced, retaining the access.

Seven local varieties of apple trees have been planted at the schools. We aim to plant more in future, perhaps plums and pears too.

Willow from Hinchingbrooke Country Park and Holt Island arrived at the eleventh hour to enable a team from the Infant School: parents, staff and children, to begin the willow fence.

We owe many thanks to HDC for providing all these trees.

<u>Patient Survey</u>: We would like to extend our thanks to all patients who took the time to participate in our annual Patient Survey which took place in late 2008.

In response to comments you made during this year's survey, we will be taking the following action:

- Having introduced a Monday evening surgery in September 2008 we will continue to keep our opening times under review on a quarterly basis.
- We have recently increased the availability of pre-bookable appointments and we will keep this
 under regular review to ensure that we can continue to meet demand for on the day appointments and still offer the flexibility of pre-booking a GP appointment to those who may find this
 more convenient.
- We will continue to regularly advertise the availability of pre-booked appointments to ensure that all our patients are aware of the provision of this service.
- Staff have recently received Customer Care Training and this will take place annually from now on so that we can further enhance the levels of service we provide to you.
- In response to those patients who suggested that it would be beneficial to leave their consultation with written details regarding their medical condition, our GPs will endeavour to provide a patient information leaflet where appropriate to do so.
- We will reinforce, and promote, the option of speaking to a member of our reception team confidentiality should a patient wish to do so.

Should you have any further comments regarding the practice please do not hesitate to contact me.

Practice Afternoon Closures: As previously detailed, so that we can continue to fulfil the training requirements of our team and allow our doctors to attend meetings regarding the commissioning, development and improvement of local patient services, the practice will be offered the opportunity to close on up to 10 afternoon sessions throughout the year. During these afternoons, emergency cover will be provided by Huntsdoc, our local out of hours provider which already provides cover overnight and at weekends. Posters will be displayed in the surgery in advance of each date to advertise these afternoon closures. Further dates have now been confirmed, and the current list of dates, which you may wish to note, is as follows:

However, we have to reapply this time next year to renew our status, by which time we will have had to achieve even more so we need more community groups and local businesses to use Fairtrade products, more shops to stock Fairtrade, and more of you to buy Fairtrade products.

Going Green

There's something very satisfying about a line full of washing blowing about in the wind. I'm always amazed at just how many days through the year are dry enough for washing to come in off the line drier than when it went out. As long as it isn't raining in the morning, my washing is out there dancing around and the best of it is it's free.

As a family, we made a positive decision years ago not to have a tumble drier, even through three children using 'real' nappies. The machines are expensive to buy, cost a fortune to run and really don't do the clothes any good either. What's more, I love that early morning walk out into the garden to put the washing out & say hello to the birds who are going mad at this time of year. It really doesn't take that long once you're in the routine & freshly dried clothes smell lovely. If it does rain, so what? The clothes get an extra rinse and they always dry eventually.

One of the more depressing aspects of winter is the constant wet washing about the house when it doesn't dry properly & very occasionally needs re-washing because it has gone smelly. This is the only time when I could use a tumble drier, but I'd rather think of all the money we're saving & CO₂ we're not producing and wait for spring to return.

If you just can't live without a tumble drier, please make sure you buy a model recommended by the Energy Saving Trust (www.energysavingtrust.org.uk) to ensure you have an energy efficient model & use it as little as possible.

For the past few months I've also been following the new advice to do most of my washing at 30°C and I really haven't noticed any difference to how clean the clothes are. Apart from saving money, it helps keep colours from fading and clothes from wearing out quite so quickly. Go on, give it a go & save more money too. Now try it with an eco washing powder, your clothes will really appreciate it. **Eco Apprentice**

SAWTRY HISTORY SOCIETY AND THE COMMUNITY ARCHIVE

Members of the Sawtry History Society recently enjoyed an engrossing talk about Huntingdonshire by the curator of the Norris Museum, Robert Burn-Murdoch, during which he revealed many surprising facts about the county, most of which deserve a place in the record books.

It appears to be the flattest county in the UK and as a busy transportation hub sees traffic by rail, water and road. In earlier times, with 46 stagecoach services a day, the Alconbury stretch of the Great North Road was once the busiest road in the country, and when the motorcar appeared Huntingdonshire introduced an early and notorious speed trap on the same road! It boasts the largest natural meadow, built the world's first prisoner of war camp, flew the very first sortie over WW2 Germany and held the very first Harvest Festival.

It holds the record for the shortest ever tenure of a Dukedom – just 30 minutes; has the oldest continuously inhabited house in England, and as well as Cromwell claims involvement with both famous and infamous people - Pepys, Churchill, Roosevelt, John Bellingham (who in 1812 assassinated the Prime Minister), and of course the 4th Earl of Sandwich whose famous "sandwich" became the worlds first "fast food" – although if in 1660 his ancestor had chosen an alternative title – 1st Earl of Portsmouth – we might now be asking for a "cheese and tomato portsmouth"!

On 19th March the SHS holds it's AGM, followed by a short quiz – and on 16th April Gordon Townsend will be talking about "The Pathfinders". SCENT AND POLLINATION - PART 9

Herbaceous Borders & Planning

One of the most pleasing sights in high summer must be the herbaceous or mixed borders in full botanical abundance which also includes the wildlife that goes along with it. The borders you see in large country houses, such as Houghton Hall can accommodate all manner of designs which are created professionally by a collection of experts with due care and diligence.

When creating or redesigning a project like an herbaceous border, you have to visualise your personal place and ensure that it will satisfy your requirements. Practical consideration and the function of the design, and your personal taste should be considered before embarking on any design. Does it push all the buttons?

Effective planning is a must here too. Get something down on paper first, think of the design as a whole rather than tackling separate parts of it. Then think budget. Remember this will be a long term project, there will be lots of changes along the way, and these have to be considered in the proposals and costs.

If the border is big enough then plants such as small trees or even larger ones depending on the size of the border can be included in the design. Climbers and shrubs, roses, bulbs such as lilies and ground cover plants can be mixed in with the herbaceous plants to give feeling of composition and cohesion. Hardy perennials (herbaceous plants) are the mainstay of any border that requires a permanent display to come up on an annual basis. You can have flowers and scent throughout the year by using a good design that utilises plants to their best advantage so that they give of their best performance.

The most common mistake is to overcrowd the plants when planting up as they will expand and fill any spaces very quickly. Plants just crammed any old how will struggle to flourish and will create tall and spindly plants that will be open to all sorts of pests and diseases. I have seen this too often where the plants are banged in with no real understanding of their needs or they are just planted in rows, awful!

Borders really need to be a minimum of 3 m (10ft) in width, but any thinner than this then really the design would have to be considerably altered, to accommodate a different designing arrangement. This is to allow the plants to expand and to grow without them impeding one another and for all the maintenance work to take place too.

This will also allow for small trees such as Acers for Example (*Acer pseudoplatanus – brilliantis-simum*) or (*A. negundo variegatum*) or maybe some Creataegus-Laburnums to be added and with shrubs such as Syringa, Buddleia, Ceanothus, Hebes and Daphne, Viburnums etc to be grown in the borders to give strength and depth to it, great for butterflies too.

You could have bulbs, corms in flower such as Galanthus (snow drops) Eranthus (winter aconite) cyclamen coum and early Crocus intermingled with ground cover plants. This too would apply throughout the year.

Any herbaceous or mixed border of shrubs and hardy perennials etc need a contrasting back cloth such as a wall, fence, or hedge. Preparation is the key to any beautiful herbaceous border.

I will elaborate on basic preparation and designing an ornamental layout next time. Until then good gardening.

If your holiday year starts on or after 1 April 2009, your right to paid holiday from work is going up from 4.8 weeks to 5.6 weeks. This means that if you work five days a week, you'll have the right to 28 days' paid leave. Your leave year may have started before 1 April 2009. If so, your annual leave will be worked out on a pro-rata basis – 4.8 weeks pro rata for the period before 1 April and 5.6 weeks pro rata for the period from 1 April 2009.

St Neots & District Cats Protection is your local rescue charity for cats and kittens. Could You Save A Life?

Did you know that in your community there is a Magpas Community First Responder group? The group was set up in November 2008 and so far has provided around 1500 hours and treated 10 patients.

What is a Community First Responder?

A Community First Responder is a local volunteer living within your community, who has undertaken training in first aid, oxygen therapy and defibrillation, and when they are available respond to 999 calls within the community. This response provides initial care and treatment for the patient in their time of need, while the ambulance is on the way.

Who do the responders attend?

A Community First Responder will be notified of patients over the age of 8 who are suffering from life threatening problems like breathing problems, chest pains, unconscious patients, fitting patients and patients suffering from a cardiac arrest. They can attend and provide lifesaving treatment until the ambulance arrives, and then assist the ambulance crew with care.

How can I get involved?

DID YOU WEIGH THE LOAD AND VEHICLE? WHAT LOADS ARE YOU CARRYING?

These are questions often asked by Trading Standard Officers attending the regular multi agency operations held at the weighbridge site just off the A1 at Sawtry. Such checks are attended by Officers from HM Customs and Excise, DVLA, Immigration, Vehicle and Operator Services Agency (VOSA), Cambridgeshire Police and, of course, Cambridgeshire Trading Standards.

The Police will direct vehicles off the A1 that are travelling in either direction and take them to the weighbridge site. Vehicles that are of interest include any vehicle that is overloaded or potentially unroadworthy. The other agencies there are looking for issues arising around tax, benefit fraud, illegal immigrants and potential MOT failures. VOSA will also be checking that the drivers of Heavy



Goods and Heavy Commercial Vehicles are taking their required rest periods throughout their journeys.

Did you know that Trading Standards do not only look out for overweight vans and lorries, they are also on the look out for livestock vehicles - anything from small horse trailers to large 6 axle split level articulated lorries designed to haulage live animals such as pigs and sheep for anything up to 24 hours! Checks on such vehicles will include:-

- whether the animals are fit to travel.
- · whether they have the correct ventilation and sufficient height and floor space,
- that the driver has the relevant movement documents and licenses that must accompany the animals on their journeys to and from markets and abattoirs.

It has also been known in the past for Trading Standards to find counterfeit items in vans, such as DVD's and alcohol. This is always a bonus because as well as the vehicle being overloaded they may also be prosecuted for the handling and/or selling of illegally copied items.

Over 33 checks have been carried out at this site over the last 7 years. The site provides an excellent location for these checks as it captures drivers of vehicles from all over the country.

So, in future, if you notice the "odd one or two" highly visible jackets while on your journeys South down the A1 [usually on a cold wet day!], just think that we are doing our utmost to cut down on crime by preventing drivers from breaching road safety laws on our busy roads.

GARTREE ROAD: A Roman road from Godmanchester to Leicester

In AD43 when the Romans invaded Britain, Godmanchester had a Celtic defended settlement. When the Romans arrived the settlement was overrun and the Romans later built a fort there. The town arose on the site of a Roman settlement (*Durolipus*)

In the Roman period Godmanchester was geographically very important, with Ermine Street (London to York), Via Devana (from Colchester to Chester) both meeting at the river crossing. The pentagonal layout of the walled Roman town still survives in the street plan of today. Excavations have revealed two of the gates, a town hall (basilica) an inn (mansio) with baths and a number of temples to various gods. The mansio is mentioned in Godmanchester's name, which came from Anglo-Saxon Godmundceaster, meaning a "town or Roman buildings associated with a man called Godmund". Galleys brought troops and heavy goods up the river Cam from the sea to berth on both sides of the river.

The Roman legions would have had to pass through dense forest that covered the central area of Britain then. They would have had to fight off blue woad covered Celts, who of course did not stand a chance against such well trained and disciplined soldiers. How much resistance the Romans came across is not known. The Romans could march forty miles a day when the going was good. A marching fort was built at each stopping point. A centurion was in charge and there were skilled craftsmen such as engineers and joiners as well.

The Roman Propietor Ostorius Scapula led his legions up Ermine Street turning off it at Alconbury Weston in a north west direction. They advanced past Salome wood, which is south of Hamerton, up to the B660. (Looking towards Hamerton with Salome Wood behind you, on the horizon Steeple Gidding Church can be seen. I used to live in a cottage in a field near the church). At this point the Roman road crosses a field and passes RAF Molesworth to join a road near Crow's Nest farm. Of course modern day roads do not follow exactly the route of the original Roman roads so we have to make slight detours to catch up with it in a few places. We have to turn right to join the B662 to pass where the main gate of RAF Molesworth used to be. At Clopton we turn left down by the church, then turn right where we join up with the Roman soldiers at Crow's Nest farm.

The road reaches Titchmarsh where it joins the A605 from Oundle and beyond it Orton Waterville. This too was a Roman road to the east. We turn left on the A605 to Thrapston, where three Roman villas and substantial buildings have been found, then on to come out at Islip. From there we pass on towards Lowick, Sudborough and Brigstock, where a temple site has been found, then onto Stanion and Corby where two tile manufacturing sites, pottery and substantial building have been discovered. We arrive at Cottingham, which had been in the lands of the Corieltauvi (formerly thought to be called Coritani) tribe. Coins belonging to them have been found in Corby, Gretton and Kettering. We go on to Medbourne which has a packhorse bridge near the church. There was a Roman settlement and two villas found there in 1946. The stretch of the Roman road from Medbourne to Leicester is broken, but where it exists today it is still known as Gartree Road. To join up with the road again we have to travel through several villages until we get to Little Stretton then by Stoughton on the right.

Our legion is now near the end of the journey as it advances out of the woods into a sunny clearing in the valley of a winding river – known today as the Soar (originally named the Leir). There was a native settlement of straw roofed huts with an earth embankment surrounding it. After a fierce struggle the peple had to submit to the might of Roman military rule. This site was the tribal capital (*civitas*) of the Celtic Corieltauvi tribe and the birthplace of the city of Leicester, known in Roman times as *Ratae Corieltauvorum*. Ratae was captured c. AD 44, and the IX Hispana legion was garrisoned there.

There is still a road called Gartree Road in Leicester today.
