



She also discussed CARESCO's Charity Shop in Sawtry and the CARESCO Cave which is also very busy repairing and making items in the local community. The charity does an enormous amount of good work in our local area with the help of an army of volunteers.

Our Knit and Knatter group have been busy making baby clothes which are packaged and shipped out to Poland and handed out to women fleeing the conflict in the Ukraine. Two parcels have already been sent and more clothes are being knitted ready to go.

NEW PRIMARY SCHOOL IN SAWTRY

Meridian Trust (the new name for Cambridge Meridian Academies Trust (CMAT) and Cambridge Primary Education Trust (CPET)) has been granted approval by the Secretary of State to sponsor a proposed new primary free school in the village of Sawtry, Cambridgeshire.

With planning approval granted for three large developments in Sawtry, Cambridgeshire County Council have identified a need for a new primary school for the village with a proposed opening date of September 2023.

The school will be built with the facilities required to offer up to 420 places in line with housing growth and increased pupil numbers over the next few years. There will also be provision for Early Years and childcare for children aged 2 - 4 years.

Meridian Trust are the sponsors of 28 schools, including 14 primary schools, 12 secondary school and two special educational needs schools. The Trust are a key part of the Sawtry community and became the sponsor of Sawtry Village Academy in 2015, closely followed by Sawtry Junior Academy in 2016. Meridian Trust also run the leisure facilities at Academy Leisure Sawtry and their operations team are based in the village, employing over 280 staff in the Sawtry area.

The existing Principal of Sawtry Junior Academy, Sarah Flack, will be the opening headteacher drawing on her existing relationships with the village community and local providers. The school will draw on the trust school improvement team, SEND expertise, and networks. HR, Site, Finance and IT capability is available within the village.

QUINTUPLICATION - PART TEN AGRICULTURAL CENTRE

It was always known as the Ag Centre and its presence in Sawtry indicated the importance of that activity. Between 1964 and 1993 (the years of population Quintuplication) were exactly the years that saw its birth, life and end. Thankfully, its premises remain standing and now returned to usefulness.

Farming was, in 1963, still an important local source of employment and the County Council provided agricultural skills training. Sometimes this happened before the Village College opened, in the (Council) School in the evenings. with Headmaster Bill Hall keeping a friendly eye on Account Keeping or Farm Safety. Classes such as Farm Welding would be held at the farms themselves.

The Ag Centre itself opened as a parallel development to the (1963) Village College. Although independent, classes were jointly promoted. In the daytime, older College pupils could benefit from courses, particularly if they intended to work in farming. Now, with its own new (1964) base, farm training could greatly expand particularly with tractors and machinery. (As an aside, I was always intrigued to note the oh-so-appropriate names of the staff: Messrs Lawn, Barter, Grocock and Frost!).

In 1966 the Centre expanded to include Rural Domestic Economy in an adjoining mobile classroom called the Homecraft Centre run by specialist teacher Mrs Robinson. This became a thriving place, both in daytime and evenings.

With the decline in agriculture as a large employer the Centre became uneconomic and closed. With it went the Homecraft Centre but, fortunately for Sawtry, not its mobile classroom. 1983 was a time of serious national unemployment but, thanks to a grant from the Cambridgeshire Community Council, the College Community Association set up a Printshop therein for unemployed youngsters. This provided a valuable service for local groups. Although this did not outlive the recession the place became the base for another caring local enterprise, our Care and Resource Organisation.

CARESCO had at that time been starting up in venues within the Village College and elsewhere. But it was only too glad now to move into this mobile, at first sharing it with the Print Shop. Their work in the Centre used volunteers running a weekly Lunch Club, and a Nearly New Clothing shop, and a drop-in advice centre, taken over from the former Homecraft Centre's work. When the Printshop, as a Job Scheme, closed, CARESCO took it over, learning the ropes and involving volunteers of all ages doing the collating. So, this print shop became the birthplace of Sawtry Eye. (The book The Story Of CARESCO, covering their years from 1982 and up to 1998, is available from CARESCO office.)

Now, what about the Ag Centre building itself? The County threatened demolition and selling the site. But the Parish Council were keen to retain it for youth work coupled with promoting much-needed low cost or sheltered housing. The County dithered and, for a while, it remained empty. Now it's back in full use as a Community Centre,

the (shifted) Library and at the far end the CARESCO Cave

(AKA Man Cave).

SAWTRY'S NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN LISTED AND NON-LISTED 'ASSETS'

You probably know that Sawtry has 17 listed grade 2 and 2* buildings ('assets') which are shown in the right hand column.

A listed building has special architectural or historic interest and is considered to be of national importance. Its name is added to the National Heritage List for England and is protected for current and future generations to enjoy. Any proposed work which affects its character requires listed building consent.

Apart from these formally listed buildings, there are many other local 'assets' (buildings, structures, archaeological sites, parks, gardens and public works of art) of importance to the character of our parish. These are termed 'non-designated heritage assets' and the recently created Cambridgeshire Local Heritage List Project (https://local-heritage-list.org.uk/cambridgeshire) has been formed to identify suitable candidates for local listing. Another useful website is the Cambridgeshire Historic Environment Record (CHER). Searches indicate that Sawtry has over 60 non-designated heritage assets which could be considered for inclusion in the Heritage List Project.

We have been invited to contribute as part of our work on the Neighbourhood Plan.

You could assist this listing task and may already have ideas for buildings and other assets which could be included.



AN EYE ON NATURE

One of the joys of spring was seeing the little bats in my garden for the first time. They have been part of my life the 14 years I have lived in Sawtry, but last September I discovered, quite by chance, that there are at least two species using 'my patch'. I was about to draw the curtains when I saw a bat literally a foot from the glass. This bigger bat was hunting larger moths attracted to the flowers. They were drawn to my garden by such an abundance of moths that I continued to see them on suitable nights whilst the buddleia bloomed.

But what species were they and which species of little pipistrelle bat also came out early in spring? I got in touch with someone who could help, a friend from the Wildlife Trust who is a professional ecologist. Henry would know!

One adaption which bats posses is the ability to echolocate, that is they send a signal similar to radar to home in on food or to avoid flying into things, including us. A great way of identifying individual species is by tuning into their signal which is at a different frequency according to species. The type of signal varies and is a diagnostic feature. A device literally called a 'bat detector' can be employed and adjusted for each bat species frequency.

Now back to my friend and the bats in my garden. Henry came round ready for the bats' emergence at dusk to catch them hunting. The detector was adjusted to pick up my little pipistrelles (pips). At 45 Hz, they were identified as common pips. The other two species of pips register at higher frequencies so we ruled them out for now. I am now waiting for my buddleia to come into full bloom and when it does, we will endeavour to identify the larger species. Henry will be back to set up another recording device which monitors remotely to identify any other species I may have missed. So, exciting times and I will report back in the next issue.

One note of caution, our villages play host to a bat population which needs our help. Bats are having a hard time with a lot of pressures heaped upon them. They live alongside us and do no harm, most of us have no idea that we are housing bat lodges too. Should you need major roof or other repairs, just check whether bats are using your house, this can be done at dusk on a warm night when the bats emerge. This will help to ensure their survival. It is also illegal to knowingly destroy bats or their roost sites.



HOLME COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH





We did continue with our speedwatch initiative during that time with one session from 8am to 9.30am recording 81 cars (normally in the region of 200) of which 15 were exceeding the 30mph limit – one even travelling at 57mph. These vehicles were coming into the village and not passing through, so again we appeal to those doing the school run or coming into work to please treat our speed limit and residents with respect.

We recently had support from a police officer with a speed gun on one of our sessions. He issued three speeding and one failure to stop tickets which could mean points on your licence and in the last case a court appearance. Please stay within the speed limit as you could find you get more than just a letter from the police.

Sadly despite all this we have recently done another session with 176 vehicles and 20% speeding so we must continue with our attempts to educate the drivers passing through our village.

If you have any area or time within Holme village that gives you concern please contact us direct, don't moan about it on Facebook as we don't do social media and will miss it.

We are still open to more volunteers, so if you feel you can spare an hour or so a month and would like to help, please get in touch and we will sort out your training with Cambridgeshire police and welcome you on board.





YOU ARE PRECIOUS, HONOURED AND LOVED

Did anyone else watch Mo Farah's revelations about his background back in July?

Mo is an icon. Not just for his running. His manner, the way he holds himself, his humility, his values and priorities; a man of integrity. He has been someone to look up to and to be proud of. And even more so after hearing his story of being trafficked into our country — something we hear about a lot but rarely see happening. Most of us have little sense of what this really means for the thousands of people this has happened to here in the UK.

One of the many things that struck me in watching the programme was the obvious strain Mo experienced holding the knowns and unknowns of his life, the journey to a point of being able to confront his reality and the need to speak out his truth regardless of the risks and consequences. Whist those of us secure in our citizenship might struggle to know what it is to have this in doubt, perhaps many of us can draw parallels with other aspects of our lives which we hide from others as we struggle to come to terms with our own true selves.

In the Gospel of Luke are all called to love God and our neighbour as ourselves (Luke10, verse 27). Samuel Wells, vicar of London's St Martins in the Fields, prolific author and regular contributor to BBC's Today Programme, points out that this is as much a call to befriend our true selves as it is to serve others. Not being able to do so is a barrier to human flourishing and a barrier to the releasing of God's abundant Grace.


Being faithful Christians is about accepting who we are, just as God accepts us, as we are. In Sawtry Methodist Church we have been studying the great prophet Isaiah, who constantly reminds us of God's faithfulness.
