TELEGRAPH POLES

As the local manager for BT Openreach in Sawtry and surrounding area I have received a serious safety complaint. The local businesses and clubs in Sawtry use the telegraph poles as notice boards, many of them are being badly damaged due to the huge number of staples and drawing pins which let water into the wood and compromise them.

.....

Remember these poles don't just hold up a few wires, they have to support engineers working from harnesses. Many poles are so covered in notices and advertisements that important safety markings, test records and climbing restrictions are concealed. Telegraph poles are part of the utility infrastructure and have to be maintained and kept safe for the engineers that need to climb them in the course of providing an important service to every house.

Residents may have noticed that the poles have recently been stripped of illegal attachments and the village looks much better for it. There is legislation covering 'Unauthorised Attachments' to recover costs of notice removal or pole replacement where the wood has been damaged by those responsible, but I would ask instead that now the village is looking neater, that those groups, businesses and clubs use the official notice boards, Sawtry Eye, local shops and local press for advertising from now on please.

UPDATE FROM CLLR DARREN TYSOE

District Councillor for Sawtry and Executive Councillor for Environment, Huntingdonshire District Council

Over the summer, I submitted a detailed response to the Draft Local Plan Consultation.

The Local Plan sets out Huntingdonshire District Council's vision for sustainable development in Huntingdonshire up to 2036. In Sawtry, three areas of housing and three employment areas are proposed.

I objected to all three of the proposed housing allocations and two of the three proposed employment areas. I pointed out that the 200+ homes currently under construction on Gidding Road were granted on appeal and additional to the existing Local Plan, hence now contributing towards Huntingdonshire's Strategic Housing needs in this Draft Local Plan. There was no reference to these homes that will increase the pressure on existing facilities and infrastructure. I also stated that the village is exhausting capacity in existing shops, congested local roads, and that the doctor's surgery is full.

Two of the proposed housing allocations were poor quality locations – squeezed in between a visual and noise screen from the A1(M) and established properties. The remaining allocation exacerbates the existing pressure on local amenities, traffic, and flood risk.

The negatives of these housing allocations are significant: the high flood risk for existing homes, with limited mitigation opportunities; loss of green space for visual screening, loss of amenity, and noise reduction, and increased urbanization for a rural village. All three allocations take away green space from the village.

Turning to the employment areas, I stated that the existing employment area off Glatton Road is severely underutilized and visually in a poor state. Its location aggravates the existing local road infrastructure traffic, causing traffic to travel through the village, including the congested High Street and Green End Road.

Two of the employment areas proposed (East of Brookside and Bill Hall Way) are well within the Sawtry village and would involve the creation of unnecessary additional capacity and the loss of green spaces for amenity use and the urbanization of the rural village, changing the character of Sawtry. The existing industrial parks are located just outside the village, yet close to the A1M and the Old North Road. These sites are convenient both for local residents to work and for workers to travel from outside of the village.

Taken together, the creation of three new employment zones is excessive and unnecessary for the needs of the village.

The next stage runs from January to February 2014. This is the formal publication of the draft Local Plan: Representations are sought on the soundness of the Local Plan and legal compliance. Representations received at this stage are sent on to the Planning Inspectorate for consideration during the examination.

Operated by CARESCO

(In partnership with Cambridgeshire County Council)

What is the Sawtry Car Scheme?

Sawtry Car Scheme provides door-to-door transport for people who do not have the use of a car and are unable to use conventional public transport.

Journeys are arranged through the co-ordinator and are provided by volunteers using their own cars. These drivers support the community by giving their time. As the scheme relies on a team of volunteers, there cannot be a guarantee that every request for a lift can be fulfilled.

Who can use the service?

People living in Sawtry and the immediate surrounding area who are unable to make vital journeys by any other means.

What type of journey can you make?

Mainly essential journeys, including but not limited to: appointments at the surgery/hospital, opticians, dentist, picking up prescriptions or shopping. Also visiting friends and relatives in hospital. The scheme is particularly aimed at helping the elderly and disabled to get out and about.

All journeys are at the discretion of the co-ordinator and are dependent upon the availability of drivers. Drivers will wait up to 2 hours, unless in exceptional circumstances.

How much does it cost?

Passengers pay a contribution of 45p per mile (minimum charge of £2.00) each time they use the service which goes towards the cost of their journey. In addition any necessary car parking fees must also be paid by the passenger.

Mileage calculation begins from the driver's home; therefore the cost of a particular journey can vary depending on where the driver lives. The fare is aimed to cover the expenses incurred by the driver, such as petrol costs and some of the wear and tear on the car.

Passengers pay their contribution to the driver on the day of travel, in cash.

How can I arrange a journey?

Call the scheme co-ordinator on the number below to book your journey. If possible, please telephone between 9.00am and 5.00pm (answer phone outside of these hours) and please try to give 48 hours notice if you can. Emergency journeys will be considered but cannot be guaranteed.

Drivers - We need you!

Do you like helping people? ~ Have a few hours to spare? ~ Hold a clean driving licence?

To help us provide transport for people who are unable to use conventional public transport or to make essential journeys by any other means. You will use your own car and received a mileage allowance for expenses incurred. Additional insurance cover is provided. Please note that a Disclosure & Barring Service check will be needed.

FIREWORK ADVICE FOR PET OWNERS

Fireworks commonly cause stress and worry to pets, as well as to their owners trying to ensure the well being of them. So here's our guide to help you and your furry friends prepare for firework festivities.



- Your pet is likely to feel safer if you're around so don't leave them alone
- It's important to keep pets inside once the fireworks start, so plan ahead and make sure any exercise and toileting is out of the way in good time
- Allow enough time for natural products available from your vets such as DAP sprays, diffusers and collars, or medicines, to take effect (you may need to plan for this weeks in advance)
- Keep your garden gate and doors shut, and make sure your pet is microchipped and wearing their collar and tag just in case they bolt in fear and escape
- Don't over fuss, this may indicate to them that there is indeed something to be frightened of
- Close the curtains and turn up the TV or radio nice and loud
- Make sure there's a cosy place where your pet can hide and feel secure. Often dogs will
 appreciate a den created under the kitchen table, a blanket on the floor behind the sofa or if
 they are crate trained, their crate
- Distract pets with their favourite game, toy or a treat just before and during fireworks
 - It's important not to punish any signs of stress or fear and remember to stay calm yourself

Unfortunately firework parties are not confined to one evening and depending on your location it can be an on going problem at this time of year. If you would like any advice, then please ask a member of staff at your local Vets who will be happy to offer further guidance.

- Chronic respiratory disease or asthma which requires continuous or repeated use of inhaled or systemic steroids
- Chronic heart disease
- Chronic renal disease

- Chronic neurological disease
- Diabetes
- Patients who are immunosuppressed
- Patients who are at any stage of pregnancy
- If you receive a carer's allowance, or if you are the main carer for an elderly or disabled person whose welfare would be at risk if you were taken ill

This year we will also be participating in the national programme to offer the flu vaccination to all children who were aged 2 or 3 on 1st September 2013. We will be writing to invite this group of patients to attend in due course.

Change of Computer System

Our new computer system will be introduced week commencing Monday 28th October 2013. We will try to ensure that this transition period is as smooth as possible from a patient perspective but there are like to be some days during this week that we will be providing emergency appointments only. Please bear with us during this time.

Online Services:

There will be no impact on the ability to request repeat prescriptions online as this service is provided via our practice website.

Patients using our online booking facility will find that there will be no availability for booking appointments for 30th October or beyond. Patients will need to re-register to use our new online appointment service and we will publicise details of how to do this in due course.

MMR Vaccinations - Update

A national MMR "catch up" programme is now underway in response to the fact that outbreaks of measles within the country are significantly increasing.

As part of this programme we have invited patients born between 01.01.97 and 31.12.03 to attend for vaccination if their records indicate that they have not previously had any MMR vaccinations. If your child has previously had single vaccines it is still recommended to have 2 full MMRs for full protection against measles and we will be inviting patients who fall into this category in due course. In the meantime, if you are aware that your child has only had one previous MMR you are welcome to call us to book an appointment for the 2nd dose.

We are also able to provide the vaccination to any patient born on or before 31.12.98 who has not previously been vaccinated or acquired natural immunity during their life time, particularly those under the age of 30 who are unlikely to have acquired natural immunity. Patients in this group should contact our reception team and make an appointment to see one of our practice nurses.

AN EYE ON NATURE

Britain's favourite animal is in trouble. The once familiar sight of a hedgehog running across a lawn like a small clockwork spiny ball is fast disappearing. Hedgehog numbers have dropped from 30 million in the 1950s to just 1.5 million by 1995 and numbers are still dropping. There are many factors contributing to their decline, but we can all do something about it and give this much loved creature a helping hand.

It will not have escaped most people's attention that our weather is very unpredictable; too wet, too dry, too hot or too cold. We all love talking about it but imagine you are a small mammal relying on stable weather patterns to feed, bring up a family, then hibernate.

It could be argued that hedgehogs are not important and if there are less around then so what? Hedgehogs are though very beneficial especially to gardeners and allotment holders. They eat all manner of pest species including snails, slugs and various grubs, beetles and other insects.

So, what can we do to help the plight of this urchin? Chemical slug pellets (especially the blue ones) are poisonous to hedgehogs, but finding an alternative, less toxic way of keeping slugs at bay will help.

Our garden fences are a barrier too. So make a smell opening or tunnel to allow the local hedgehogs free access to all the gardens in your neighbourhood. This will increase their available foraging area. Keeping an area a bit more wild in your garden will help so they have somewhere to sleep during the day. My hedgehogs enjoy a bowl of water always kept full. Build a home out of sticks, logs and leaves. This will also do as a hibernation site.

Feeding hedgehogs is becoming more popular but please do not feed them milk soaked bread, it is bad for them, much better to give them dog food or cat food. In autumn feeding hedgehogs can be a life saver, enabling them to make enough fat reserves to get them through winter hibernation.

If by late autumn you do find hedgehogs roaming around in daylight and they look a bit small, collect them up in a box and take them to a wildlife centre where they will be cared for during the winter. Small hedgehogs cannot hibernate because their fat reserves are just not good enough. Please consider a donation if you do take your underweight friend to a centre as it will need to be fed all winter.

SAWTRY HISTORY SOCIETY

Whitehall, (for the older readers not Whitehall 1212!) Coppingford was the subject of a talk and slide show on the 19th September by Alan Bottell, Chairman of the History Society.

It is believed to have been built in 1840 for the Cavendish family. Charles Compton Cavendish was the 1st Baron Chesham from 1793-1863. During the 1st World War it was used as a Voluntary Aid Detachment (VAD) hospital. James McWilliams MM, wrote home from the hospital, coincidentally to Huntingdon, Canada.

In 1924 the property was brought by 'Major' Richard Fitton who lived there with his wife and 3 children. The family came from Lancashire and were owners of cotton mills. A local girl called Audrey (later Audrey Wright) started her working career at the age of 14/15yrs as a housemaid. Her duties being hand written by Mrs Fitton. Mr & Mrs Fitton divorced in the 1960s, Mr Fitton died in 1970 leaving the house to the 2 sons, one of whom later moved into the stable bungalow. The property was eventually bought by the Whitfield Group direct from liquidators and let to the Supreme Concrete Ltd in 1999, who have maintained the house which still has several original features. The history of the house is

extensive, hunting, shooting, riding and tea parties are just a few of the activities that took place there.

Our next meeting is on the 17th October, a talk by Phil Hill on Archaeology of Sawtry, he is hoping to have a display of items found locally.

RSPB - NATURE ON YOUR DOORSTEP - GET INVOLVED

Have you ever seen a skylark, turtle dove, or brown hare? Did you know local farmers are helping wildlife on their doorstep? It's true, a group of local farmers between Peterborough and Wisbech have joined together to form the Thorney Farmland Bird Friendly Zone to help wildlife and they want you to come find out more!

These farmers haven't given up their day job to do this. They are working with the RSPB to farm more sensitively, giving Nature a home whilst still producing crops. Janet Herbert, one of the farmers involved in the project, sums up how it makes her feel to be part of the project: "It really melts the heart to watch flocks of little songbirds cheerfully playing over a field of wild bird seed mix, searching out seeds and insects. Undertaking stewardship as an individual farmer is certainly rewarding, but to also be part of the Thorney Farmland Bird Friendly Zone is even more fantastic because working together the benefits to birds and wildlife are increased enormously."

Many farmland birds have declined at a worrying rate. We've lost over half of our skylarks since 1970, whilst turtle doves are likely to disappear from the UK by 2020 if we don't help them. By creating wildlife habitat like wild bird cover and beetle banks, the farmers have not only been supporting these birds, but also many other farmland creatures including bees, butterflies, hares, hoverflies and water voles.

Fens Futurescape Community Engagement Officer, Jane Andrews-Gauvain, says "Can you imagine if you couldn't enjoy your orange juice, jam, or honey? This is what would happen if bees and other pollinators weren't around to pollinate flowers. It would cost £1.8bn a year for farmers to replace the pollination service bees provide for free. We wouldn't even have our basic tomato and Mozzarella toppings for a pizza – so the work of the farmers really is important– come and see for yourself!"

Thanks to these farmers' work and support, the RSPB is offering opportunities for all ages and abilities to come and discover how farmers are helping wildlife on their farms. Between October 2013 and January 2014 there will be chances for you to join in on a nature walk, spot

some farmland species, enjoy a spooky Halloween trail and/or learn how to help wildlife on your own doorstep.

GIVE YOUR UNWANTED TEXTILES A HOME

Textiles make up about three per cent of the weight of a household bin. At least half of the textiles we throw away can be recycled, however the proportion of textile waste reused or recycled annually in the UK is only around a quarter. By reusing and recycling textiles you will help to reduce the amount of this rubbish ending up in landfill.

Textiles include curtains, bedding, towels, handbags, cloths as well as clothes and shoes, all of which can be reused or recycled into other useful products.

Many textiles that are in good condition can be reused or recycled in many ways, but unfortunately NOT through Huntingdonshire District Council's kerbside recycling scheme, so here are a few ways in which you can dispose of your unwanted textiles.

- Take good quality, clean sellable textiles to a local charity shop.
- Put them in a textile bank which you will find sited throughout the district. Try and make sure clothes are clean and dry before you donate them and tie shoes together. Your parish council receives money for every ton of textiles that are recycled within your local bank. This money will then be used within your community, so we encourage you to use these sites to benefit all. Find your nearest place to recycle your unwanted textiles at <u>www.huntingdonshire.gov.uk/recyclingcentres</u>
- Charities also make door-to-door collections. Keep an eye out for those plastic sacks coming through your letterbox.
- As with any materials, reusing within your home has many benefits. Discarded sheets and holey t-shirts make excellent cleaning cloths and dusters. Old clothes, such as jeans can be turned in to fashionable accessories such as handbags or cushion covers. Let your creative side come out and customise it to make something that is unique.

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COTTON ON TO FAIRTRADE

For an estimated 100 million rural households in 70 countries the primary source of income comes from producing cotton. Many of these households include small-scale farmers and most of the world's cotton, around two thirds, is produced in the developing world. In fact, cotton makes up 40% of West Africa's export income but because of cheap, subsidised cotton from the USA dumped on world markets, farmers are finding it increasingly difficult to make a living because of the unstable world prices for cotton.

Fairtrade certified cotton farmers are paid a guaranteed minimum price for their cotton crop, enough to cover the sustainable costs of production. The Fairtrade system gives them a greater security through advance payments available on request, long-term relationships with buyers and democratically run co-operatives strengthening the position of each, individual farmer. Fairtrade farmers also meet certain environmental standards to better protect the land, water and soil they rely on for next year's harvest. Lastly, they receive – the Fairtrade premium – to invest in the projects they know their business or community needs most. Decisions on how the premium is spent are made democratically. So, be it a school, health centre, new seeds, investing in organic farming or a well, the decision is theirs.

IS RENEWABLE ENERGY FOR YOU?

As solar panels become a common sight around our neighbourhoods, you may be wondering what options are available to you to save or even generate your own energy but it can be daunting knowing where to start.

At Trading Standards we want to help you find a trader you can trust and make sure you know what you can expect of these businesses.

When considering the options available to you, the Energy Saving Trust (<u>www.energysavingtrust.org.uk</u>) is a good place to start. They are an independent organisation that provides free, expert advice on saving energy in your home. Their website contains extensive information, and they also have a helpline which can be contacted on 0300 1231234 (national rate).

In terms of funding any improvements, if you aren't able to pay for them up front, you could consider the Government's Green Deal Scheme (<u>www.gov.uk/green-deal-energy-saving-measures</u>) which allows for repayment over a period of time through your energy bills. As with any finance arrangement, make sure you know how much you will have to repay in total, what the monthly charges will be, and check the interest rate is competitive with other finance options. You should also be aware that with Green Deal the debt attaches to the property, so if you sell it, your buyer will have to take over the debt. If you need advice on finance options, your local Citizens Advice Bureau will be able to help you.

There are a range of businesses that offer home assessment visits to advise you on the options most suitable for your specific circumstances. You will usually need to pay for this and you should check whether there is a tie-in clause requiring you to use a certain business to do the installation work if you decide to go ahead. The assessment will give you estimated savings projections for the first year based on a specific level of energy usage. Unfortunately this means you won't know exactly what you will save, but you can at least check to make sure the estimate is based on a realistic level of energy usage for your situation.

In terms of finding a trader, it is important to shop around to ensure the business is reputable and that the price is fair before agreeing to any work.

Green Deal has its own approved assessors and installers, but if you are not using Green Deal we would recommend that you find an installer and products that are part of the Micro Generation Certification Scheme (MCS) or are Renewable Energy Assurance Limited (REAL) approved. These

organisations have codes of practice that traders have to comply with and standards that the products have to meet. The Energy Saving Trust website allows you to search for local installers who belong to MCS. Some members also sit on our Buy With Confidence approved trader scheme giving you even greater assurance that they are businesses you can trust. Visit <u>www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk</u> for more details.

As always, we would recommend getting three quotes to ensure the installation price and projections are reasonable, and check the terms and conditions carefully before agreeing to anything.
